The *Report on the Regulation and Control of Hazardous Biological Materials* recommended establishing a national regulatory regime based on a risk management approach. It also recommended that administration of the national regulatory scheme should be given to a responsible body. This responsible body resides within the Australian Centre for Disease Control (CDC).

The Public Health Division (PHD) within the Australian CDC is the division responsible for administering the Security Sensitive Biological Agents (SSBA) Regulatory Scheme.

The SSBA Regulatory Scheme includes:

- The *National Health Security Act 2007* (NHS Act).
- The National Health Security Regulations 2018 (NHS Regulations).
- The SSBA Standards.
- The National Register of Security Sensitive Biological Agents (National Register).
- Registration and reporting processes.
- An inspection program.
- An education and awareness raising campaign.

The ongoing work of PHD includes:

- Monitoring the registration and reporting of Australian entities and facilities handling SSBA.
- Managing the National Register.
- Monitoring and reviewing the regulatory scheme.
- Co-ordinating reviews of the List of SSBA.
- Managing the ongoing education and awareness-raising campaign.
